Proposal Submitted

On Tuesday, March 11, 2025 the Sabbatical Committee submitted its request for \$38,592 to the Lilly Clergy Renewal Program to cover Pastor Karen's costs and St. Mark's cost for a proposed sabbatical. The proposed dates are April 19, 2026 – July 18, 2026. The grant's receivers will be announced on August 29, 2025. Please keep the process in prayer as we await the outcome. Thursday, March 13, 2025

Council met on March 13, 2025. Here are some highlights of that meeting. The full minutes will be available once they have been approved at the April meeting.

Council Highlights

- Minutes of February meeting were approved
- Financial Reports for January and February were approved.
- Reviewed plans for Congregation Retreat on March 22
- Received an update on the IT process the next computer to be replaced will be the

one we use for slides in worship. The purchase and set-up is in process.

- Social Media update: "It's Just Creative" Social Media group has begun the audit process.
- We thanked the Seeker's Circle for their donations of quilt supplies and Preschool
- Anniversary party favors and recipes for soups made for Lent midweek daytime services.
- Reviewed Food Pantry Report and agreed to ask Tom for clarification on some of the items.
- June Johnsen and Janelle Jolley are in the process of preparing a report to council for security alarm needs.
- Pastor Karen's Sabbatical update was shared with the council and congregation.
- The grant request was submitted on March 11. We will know on August 29 if we received the grant.
- Volunteer Appreciation Day was set for May 4, 2025.
- Agreed to receive \$500 per month from the Food Pantry to help with utilities and reduce the expectation from the Preschool by \$500 on a trial basis.
- Council decided that we would only consider "special" birthday celebrations for those members who turn 90. This will help avoid leaving someone out. We will continue to celebrate monthly birthdays on the first Sunday of the month.
- Dan DiSano was assigned as liaison to the Growing Together and Social Justice Teams.
- Our active ministries will be encouraged to plan a temple talk and/or special focus month for their ministries.

The next Council meeting will be April 10, 2025, at 4:00 p.m. in the Digerud Room.



Stewardship of Being Kind:

Yes, research consistently shows that performing good deeds, or acts of kindness, are strongly linked to improved

well-being, including increased happiness, reduced stress, better social connections, and even potential health benefits; essentially, "doing good" can contribute to feeling good about yourself and your life. During the last weeks of Lent, be attentive to taking care of yourself and others by paying attention to the following information. Key points about the connection between good deeds and well-being:

• Positive emotions:

Engaging in acts of kindness can trigger the release of feel-good chemicals like dopamine and serotonin, leading to feelings of happiness and satisfaction.

• Stress reduction:

Helping others can take your mind off your own problems, providing a stress-relieving effect.

• Social connection:

Performing good deeds can strengthen relationships and foster a sense of community.

Self-esteem boost:

Seeing yourself positively impact others can contribute to a higher self-worth.

 Potential physical benefits:
 Studies have even suggested a link between altruistic behavior and improved physical health,

potentially by reducing stress levels.




Opportunities for Lent


The first Lent Soup Lunch and devotions.



Bread for the World's 2025 Nourish Our Future

On Tuesday, February 4, Bread for the World launched the Nourish Our Future campaign to end child hunger. More than 1,200 participated online and at the U.S. Capitol, making this Bread's largest public action ever. Amidst pauses, cuts, and confusion about vital aid programs, I am truly inspired by the solidarity and support of so many people calling on Congress to unite around policies that will reduce food insecurity among children. If you were unable to attend the launch, we encourage you to watch the recording here.

Our president and CEO, Rev. Eugene Cho, chaired the meeting and was joined by our managing director, Rev. Heather Taylor, and the chair of our board of directors, Dr. Jeremy Everett. Seven members of Congress —four Democrats and three Republicans—attended and spoke in support of the <u>Nourish Our Future</u> priorities: expanding the Child Tax Credit, addressing college hunger, securing robust funding for global nutrition, and fully funding and strengthening the WIC program. But it was the personal testimonies that grounded the meeting. Four women shared their stories and reminded us that these policies are about real people. At the launch, we asked each member of Congress to commit to work with us to pass the Nourish Our Future priorities. Individual participants were asked—to commit to hold an Offering of Letters, a simple yet powerful letterwriting event. Look for more information about St. Mark's Offering of letters to be held in April or May, depending upon the Council's guidance. Rev. Cho reminded us Tuesday evening of the somber realities in front of us. The dismantling of USAID is a tragedy that will have real consequences for human lives. Proposed cuts for domestic safety net programs like SNAP and Medicaid threaten the health and wellbeing of families and children across the nation. But Bread for the World's event provided hope. It showed that when we join together-through our churches, campuses, with Bread for the World—we can make an impact. It also showed us that there are Republicans and Democrats committed to working together to implement the Nourish Our Future priorities. Let's continue to lean into this hope, and let's model for our communities and for Congress what we want the focus of our public life to be-creating a future where all people, everywhere, are nourished as the Bible tells us so.
